Why should I take AP Exams?

- To get college credit – and ultimately that saves money and time!!

And remember you already put in all the hard work throughout the year

**AP Exam Scores are NOT used
as criteria for admission to
college.**

About the tests

- Most of the tests are about 2 to 3 hours long.
- The first part of the exam usually consists of multiple choice questions. Your total score on this section is based only on the number of questions answered correctly. You won't receive or lose points for incorrect answers or unanswered questions.

About the tests

- The second part of the exam usually consists of free-response questions that require you to generate your own answers. Depending on the exam this could be in the following forms:
 - Essay
 - Solution to a problem
 - Spoken response

The “small” things really matter

- Get a good night’s rest

AP Test Scoring

AP scores are reported on a 5 point scale:

5-Extremely well Qualified

4-Well Qualified

3-Qualified

2-Possibly Qualified

1-No Recommendation

“Qualified” means that you have proven yourself capable of doing the work of an introductory-level course in a particular subject at college.

So what is a “good score” ??

Many colleges and universities grant credit and placement for scores of a 3, 4 or 5, however, each college decides on what score it will accept.

When are scores available?

AP score reports are available in July to the college designated on the student's registration answer sheet, to the student and the student's high school and district.

You may send additional score reports at a later time at a cost of \$15.00 per college.

Students with Disabilities

If a student has a documented disability, he/she may be eligible for accommodations on AP Exams.

Examples of accommodations:

- Extended Time
- Large Block Answer Sheets
- Writer/Scribe to record responses

All accommodations must be approved by College Board's Services for Students with Disabilities.

AP Exam Cost


- \$94.00 Per Exam
- \$53.00 Per Exam for students on free/reduced lunch

Clayton students who sign up for AP exams will have one exam paid for by the Clayton Public School District

****Note – Student must be enrolled in the AP course. Parents of students who decide not to take an AP Exam, after it has been ordered, may be responsible for the full cost of the exam****
